

APPLY FOR/FIND YOUR EIN

Stay on top of your business

An Employer Identification Number (EIN) is used to identify a business entity.

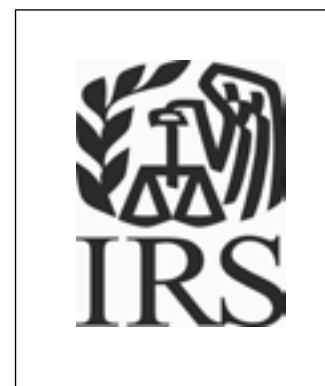
Brokers typically use this number to ensure the trucking businesses they work with are compliant. Not having or knowing your EIN number could mean a delay in invoice payment. Ensuring you have accurate and up-to-date information on file will make the entire factoring process seamless.

How to Apply for EIN

EINs must be used by all business entities. Follow the steps below to set up your business EIN:

- 1. Determine your eligibility**
 - Ensure your principle business is located in the USA
 - Have a valid taxpayer identification number
- 2. Understand the online application, found on irs.gov**
 - You must complete the application at one time
 - A session will expire at 15 min of inactivity
- 3. Submit your application**
 - Your EIN will be issued immediately once all validations are complete



How to Find a Lost EIN Number

If you have previously applied for and received your business' EIN, but have since misplaced the number, try the following steps to locate it.

- Find the computer-generated notice that was issued by the IRS when you applied for your EIN.
- If you used your EIN to open a bank account or apply for any type of state or local license, you should contact the bank or agency to secure your EIN.
- Find a previously filed tax return for your existing entity, it should be notated with your EIN.
- Ask the IRS to search for your EIN by calling the Business & Specialty Tax Line at 800.829.4933.
